
## Presentations by Australian Deep Ecology Activist John Seed

October 8-12, 2003 The University of Florida



John Seed is founder and director of the Rainforest Information Centre in Australia, and one of the world's leading proponents of deep ecology spirituality as a way to connect to nature and reharmonize life on earth.

Once dubbed by the <u>Christian Science Monitor</u> "the town crier for the global village", Seed began his forest activism 1979 fighting for the protection of the Australian rainforests. After founding the Rainforest information Centre <u>www.rainforestinfo.org.au</u> he helped create the US-based Rainforest Action Network in 1984.

In 1987 he co-produced a television documentary for Australian national television about the struggle for the rainforests, which was subsequently shown around the world

**Seed** has created numerous projects protecting rainforests in South America, Asia and the Pacific, deploying a strategy that includes providing benign and sustainable development projects for their indigenous inhabitants tied to the protection of their forests.

He has written and lectured extensively on deep ecology and has been conducting Councils of All Beings and other re-Earth'ing workshops all over the world. With Joanna Macy, Pat Fleming and Professor Arne Naess, he wrote *Thinking Like a Mountain: Towards a Council of All Beings*, which has now been translated into 10 languages.

An accomplished bard and songwriter Seed has produced 5 albums of environmental songs and has scripted and produced several videos, the latest of which is called "Work in Progress".

In 1995 he was awarded the Order of Australia Medal (OAM) by the Australian Government for services to conservation and the environment.

## PROTECTING THE RAINFORESTS: CASE STUDIES FROM PAPAU NEW GUINIE AND ECUADOR

John Seed has been working for the protection of the world's rainforests since 1979. For over 15 years John and his colleagues at the Rainforest Information Centre have been focusing particular attention on the rainforests of Ecuador, one of the most diverse places on Earth. Today a massive threat is looming in the form of the OCP crude oil pipeline being built from the Ecuadorian Amazon, over the Andes, to the Pacific coast. If completed it will double the amount of oil that can be extracted from the Amazon headwaters. John will screen Juan Pablo Barragan's brilliant video "AmazonOil Pipeline - Pollution, Corruption and Poverty" and speak about how we can all help to prevent the devastation of this unique area.
